- Florida is the only state in the nation that imposes a sales tax on businesses renting or leasing commercial property, known as the Business Rent Tax.
- This tax puts Florida at a disadvantage compared to every other state in the nation as it is exclusive to Florida.
- Florida Chamber has led the effort to reduce and eventually fully eliminate this Florida-only tax for over a decade.

RE: Please Fully Eliminate the Florida-Only Business Rent Tax

Dear Members of the Florida Legislature,

The undersigned chambers of commerce, representing job creators and local businesses from across Florida, urge you to fully eliminate the Florida-only business rent tax during the 2025 legislative session.

We appreciate the efforts the Florida Legislature has made over the last several years to reduce the Florida-only business rent tax, which puts our local businesses at a competitive disadvantage compared to businesses in other states. Since 2017, the legislature has taken several steps to reduce the sales tax paid on commercial leases, but there is still more work to be done. As you know, Florida remains the only state in the country to levy this tax on local businesses, and while the business rent tax is now at two percent, that is still an approximately \$760 million burden on Florida-based businesses.

Savings resulting from elimination or significant reduction of this tax would allow local businesses to reinvest back in their business, in their employees and in their communities. Beyond the impact that the tax savings would have locally, fostering a business-friendly tax climate is pivotal for not only attracting out of state businesses, but for encouraging Florida-based businesses to expand within the state instead of seeking opportunities elsewhere. As we work to grow Florida to the 16th to the 10th largest global economy, it is imperative we continue to reinvest in Florida's local communities and businesses by building upon your efforts to foster the most business-friendly tax climate in the country.


Continuing to reduce or fully eliminate Florida's business rent tax is important to Florida's business community because it:
