2024–2025 QUARTER 1 REPORT

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The first quarter of 2024-2025 has started strong. After a slow September and October, tourism numbers rebounded strongly to end the year. The County welcomed two new commissioners as the local, regional, and national elections unfolded. Ann Taylor and Clay Murphy joined the board along with Christian Whitehurst's reelection. The board elected Krista Joseph to serve as Chair for this year.

The voters in St. Johns County also passed two separate tax referendums on the November ballot. The Board of Directors of the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce supported the extension of the ½ cent sales tax and the 1-mill increase on property taxes. These were crucial investments in our schools and students, as an educated workforce is one of the greatest assets to any community. The Chamber is a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization that does not endorse political candidates but does weigh in on specific issues that can impact the business community.

The EDC Breakfast series welcomed David Altig, executive vice president and chief economic advisor at the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, as the program's featured speaker for the first event of this fiscal year. Altig shared information about the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta's latest monetary policy and how it affects business and industry in our region. He also discussed inflation and its local impact. Altig also provided a national economic forecast and shared key performance indicators businesses should monitor in the coming months.

Mobility needs are still a significant concern in the County. During a recent open house meeting, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) shared details about the next phase of the First Coast Expressway. The project will connect the First Coast Expressway construction in Clay County to St. Johns County with the construction of a new four-lane bridge over the St. Johns River just south of where the Shands Bridge currently stands. The bridge will then move across the County to connect to I-95 between the State Road 210 and World Golf Parkway exits.

Finally, the Chamber ended the year with the CELEBRATE Annual Awards Ceremony, where various business leaders who made their mark in the community this year were recognized. The event marked the 120th year of the Chamber. Chamber CEO Isabelle Renault read a proclamation from the Congressional Record provided by Congressman John Rutherford and a timeline unveiled, marking the history of the Chamber. Historic Tours of America provided period-attired actors to take the group back to 1904 when the Chamber membership first gathered. The 1904 Celebrate event featured President Teddy Roosevelt as the keynote speaker.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL QUARTERLY BREAKFAST EVENT DECEMBER 6, 2024



Looking ahead was the focus of the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce's quarterly Economic Development Council Breakfast on Friday, Dec. 6, in St. Augustine. The Chamber welcomed David Altig, executive vice president and chief economic advisor at the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, as the program's featured speaker. He shared information about the latest monetary policy from the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta and how it affects business and industry in our region. He also discussed inflation and its local impact. Altig also provided a national economic forecast and shared key performance indicators businesses should monitor in the coming months.

In his predictions for the year, Altig pointed out that forecasting is a best guess, and this year was "rock solid" despite indications that the economy would not be as strong as it is.



"The economy is remarkably robust even in the face of historically rapidly tightening monetary policy," he told attendees, noting that election years are not always this friendly to economic activity. Altig also explained that the Federal Reserve does not make policy but is a "taker" of policy from Washington, D.C.

Altig also noted that every new administration brings changes and adjustments. Policy decisions, such as tariffs, could decrease spending if prices are adversely affected, and the expansion of AI into business and the market could also have an effect. The latest data shows that most unskilled jobs have not been affected by AI, and only a fraction of high-skill workers use the technology significantly. Productivity has remained high even as the labor market has softened, and immigration is helping to keep labor market inflation low by making up for the lower birth rate among US citizens.

During the EDC Quarterly Breakfast, the Chamber recognized the Jacksonville Aviation Authority, England Thims & Miller Inc. and the Jacksonville Transportation Authority for their contributions to the Chamber and the Region. All three organizations play a vital role in economic development for the area.



CONSTRUCTION OF FIRST COAST EXPRESSWAY STARTS IN ST. JOHNS COUNTY

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) shared details about the next phase of the First Coast Expressway during a recent open house meeting. This is a significant infrastructure project that will expand connectivity in Northern St. Johns County.

The project will connect the First Coast Expressway construction in Clay County to St. Johns County with the construction of a new four-lane bridge over the St. Johns River just south of where the Shands Bridge



currently stands. The design-build team of WGI, Inc., Johnson Bros. Corporation and American Bridge was selected to complete the project at a cost of approximately \$595 million. The vertical clearance height of the new bridge will be 65 feet from the water line, compared to the existing 45 feet of clearance. The additional 20 feet will match the Buckman Bridge's clearance and is an improvement for marine commerce in the region.

From there the project will be completed in phases to ultimately connect to Interstate 95 between the CR 210 exit and the World Golf Parkway exit. One phase of the First Coast Expressway consists of a new four-lane limited-access toll facility from east of the County Road 16A to east of County Road 2209 in St. Johns County. De Moya Asphalt Joint Venture. was awarded the contract to construct this project, which includes milling and resurfacing, earthwork, subsoil excavation, base work, shoulder treatment, drainage improvements, curb and gutter, traffic signals, lighting, highway signing, guardrail, box culverts, bridges, MSE walls, sidewalks/bicycle path, intelligent transportation systems (ITS), tolling, and other incidental construction.

The entire project is projected to be completed by 2030.

In the last three years, he's attended and volunteered at over 100 events and ribbon cuttings. He also mentors new Ambassadors, helping them develop their roles as catalysts for business connections as they engage new Chamber members. The Chamber Ambassadors are volunteers who assist with welcoming new members and visiting renewing members each year.

The Small Business of the Year award went to Culver's of St. Augustine. Garth and Lisa Darton's restaurant on A1A South was recognized as one of the Top 5 Culvers in the country by receiving the Crew Challenge Award, which acknowledges areas of quality, service, cleanliness, hospitality, community outreach, and team member training and development. Craig Culver, co-founder of Culver's, recognized the team for its exceptional performance and for going the extra mile to make guests happy.

The Fred Schroeder Economic Development Council award was presented to Baptist Health.

Baptist Health / Wolfson Children's Hospital opened a dual Emergency Room and Imaging Center earlier this year. The 23,879-square-foot facility features two emergency centers under one roof – Baptist Emergency Center for adults and Wolfson Children's Emergency Center, designed specifically for patients ages 0 to 17. In addition, with the opening of this campus, families in St. Johns County will have easier access to the specialized pediatric care of Wolfson Children's Hospital, the only full-service children's hospital in the region and the only statedesignated Pediatric Trauma Center in Northeast Florida.

The Chamber Member of the Year Award was presented to Historic Tours of America, the parent company of Old Town Trolley Tours. Historic Tours of America has been a key supporter of the Chamber's Autism Certification efforts over the past year. They were the first business in St. Johns County to achieve the Certified Autism Center designation, demonstrating a commitment to creating more inclusive, accommodating, and welcoming environments for neurodivergent individuals and their



families. The company's local attractions were certified, including Old Town Trolley Tours, Old Jail, Oldest Store Museum Experience, St. Augustine History Museum, and Potter's Wax Museum.

The prevalence of autism diagnoses has increased to 1 in 36 children in the US and 1 in 6 people with sensory needs. As a result, it has become increasingly vital to equip businesses and organizations with the knowledge and tools to engage and assist these individuals and their families effectively. The Certified Autism Center designation by these organizations marks a significant step forward for the larger movement. It makes St. Johns County an inclusive, welcoming destination for visitors and residents. The company's leadership and example have encouraged nine other local tourism and hospitality businesses to complete the certification process, bringing us closer to the goal of St. Johns County becoming a Certified Autism Destination.



The event concluded with the passing of the gavel ceremony from Immediate Past Chair Berta Odom with RE/ MAX Realty 100 to Orv Dothage with Northrop Grumman.

NORTHEAST FLORIDA MONTHLY EMPLOYMENT REPORT NOVEMBER 2024

FloridaCommerce has announced that the unemployment rate for the Jacksonville region was 3.6 percent in November 2024 – up slightly from October 2024.

Of the 872,040 people counted as part of the area's labor force in November, there were 31,271 unemployed residents in the region – up from 30,662 unemployed residents in October.

REGIONAL EMPLOYMENT UPDATE

In November, Nassau County and St. Johns County recorded the lowest unemployment rates in the region (3.4 percent), followed by Clay County (3.6 percent), Duval County (3.6 percent), Baker County (3.8 percent) and Putnam County (4.6 percent).

The industries gaining jobs over the year were Education and Health Services (+ 6,600 jobs); Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (+ 2,600 jobs); Mining, Logging, and Construction (+ 2,500 jobs); Leisure and Hospitality (+ 2,500 jobs); Government (+ 1,800 jobs); and Other Services (+ 900 jobs). Industries losing jobs included Financial Activities (- 3,000 jobs); Professional and Business Services (- 1,100 jobs); Manufacturing (- 300) and Information Services (- 100 jobs).

The current top-five most advertised job occupations among all industries in the region included retail salespersons (1,816 positions), first-line supervisors of retail salespersons (1,718 positions), registered nurses (1,305), medical and health services managers (1,097 positions), and sales representatives of services – except advertising, insurance, financial services and travel – (1,015).

HIGH SCHOOL SHOWCASE



Students and their parents recently attended the St. Johns County School District High School Programs of Interest Showcase. The event is held each year at the St. Johns County Convention Center, located at the Renaissance World Golf Village Resort. A detailed listing of each Program of Interest can be found on the district's Career and Technical Education website.

The Programs of Interest Showcase is offered to support a student's interests, career plans, or advanced academic

needs. A student who enrolls in a Program of Interest participates in theme-related classes over a multi-year period. Approximately 56 percent of high school students in St. Johns County are enrolled in various career and technical education pathways which include the Early Career Program and 28 Career Academies. Additionally, students may participate in other Programs of Interest options such as Junior ROTC, St. Johns County Center for the Arts, Advanced International Certificate of Education, International Baccalaureate and the Early College Program.

Students and staff from each high school were available at the Showcase to provide information and answer questions about the Programs of Interest offered at their schools. Information about program requirements and registration will also be available. Any student who meets an individual program's requirements and who can provide his/her own transportation may be approved to attend any high school, on a "space available" basis.

The St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce, JAXUSA's Talent Division, First Coast Technical College and St. Johns River State College also set up booths to showcase programs and employment opportunities in the region. Aliyah Meyer, St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce Economic Development Coordinator, said, "This is a great opportunity for us to showcase employers of all types in our region to students and parents. We realize that many people are new to this area and may not be aware of the variety of businesses and industry that exists. There are opportunities in St. Johns County that align with every Career Academy in the district. The local employers provide students with job shadow and internship experiences while they are still in high school."

Program of Interest applications were accepted online from eighth- and ninth-grade students residing in St. Johns County following the Showcase. Space is limited in all programs and a lottery system is utilized to place applicants. Priority is provided to students zoned for each school. Priority is also provided to active military families who have provided their status with their current school.

SJC CHAMBER SUPPORTS SUCCESSFUL SCHOOL BOARD TAX REFERENDUMS TO ENSURE HIGHEST QUALITY OF LIFE

The chamber is a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization that does not endorse political candidates but does weigh in on specific issues that can impact the business community.

"Any new or additional tax increases the potential burden on businesses in St. Johns County, and raising taxes is never the first choice for revenue, but the chamber views these taxes as an investment in our economy," said Isabelle Renault, president and CEO of the chamber. "Our schools are an economic engine for the county. Employees seek to live in areas with great schools, and employers will follow the talent."

State regulations limit school districts' options for raising revenue, and a millage increase is the "last lever the school district has to pull," St. Johns County School District Superintendent Tim Forson said in a presentation at the chamber's Sept. 20 Economic Development Council Breakfast. "Property tax is an integral, vital part of funding public education in Florida."

As new businesses and industries enter our region and existing businesses seek to expand, the highest priority is often access to an educated workforce. St. Johns County School District, consistently ranked among the best in Florida, is important in attracting and retaining these new and expanding businesses as they follow the talent pool.

"The sales tax extension is heavily borne by tourists, and the millage increase will contribute to a stronger, more educated future workforce by attracting and retaining the best teachers for our children," said Orv Dothage, chair of the chamber's board of directors. "St. Johns County schools are also developing a high-quality homegrown workforce, especially for technical jobs. Investing in our schools is an investment in our current and future workforce."

The school district offers students a variety of opportunities through career academies and technical education, and the proposed tax revenue is critical to supporting these programs, which train students in subjects like biomedical science, aviation, agriculture, advanced manufacturing, construction, and logistics.

The programs create a pipeline of well-trained, well-educated employees for businesses in the county but require a significant financial investment by the school district. The half-cent sales tax and 1-mill increase are estimated to produce nearly \$100 million in revenue for the school district.

- At the end of Q1, there were a total of 26 active businesses in the pipeline. The announced pending project should be revealed in quarter two.
- These projects represented a wide variety of industrial types.



- There are a total of thirteen businesses in the pipeline for the targeted industries of Advanced Manufacturing/Aviation (8 projects), Health and Biomedical (5 projects).
- The Education prospect is also directly related to manufacturing/aviation.



- JaxUSA continues to refer new projects. Quarter one was slower due to a slowdown nationwide during the national election cycle.
- Twenty-six (26) total projects remained in the pipeline.



- Current projects in the pipeline seek service or commercial space (4 projects), industrial or manufacturing space (8 projects), health or medical facilities (5 projects), warehouse/ distribution (3 projects), retail/entertainment space (5 projects) and education/training space (1 project).
- The Foundry Project on World Golf Parkway will add 500,000 square feet of warehouse/ light industrial space by quarter two of 2025.



- The majority of the current projects in the pipeline seek to lease (14 projects) or build-tosuit space (8 projects).
- Four projects indicated an interest in purchasing an existing building in St. Johns County.
